Nursing School Alumnae Enhance Fire Safety With Gift of EVAC+Chairs

BEING ABLE TO EVACUATE THE PROVINCIAL BUILDING quickly and safely in a fire emergency is an important part of making the Bon Secours Spiritual Center a safe and secure environment for guests and resident Sisters. Evacuating a person who needs the use of a wheelchair or has some disability – when electrical power may be out and elevators are not to be used – is a serious challenge for the staff. Thankfully, a gift from the alumnae of the Bon Secours School of Nursing has resolved a key piece of that challenge.

The alumnae gift has enabled the center to purchase two EVAC+Chairs, which allow a person who cannot easily walk to ride down steps on a staircase tread attached to the bottom of the chair itself. The devices are simple to use, comfortable to ride, and safe. The chair can be operated and controlled by one attendant.

Sisters and guests who need assistance can be evacuated with a small amount of physical effort on the part of one staff person. The design of the chair prevents it from taking off by itself. Descent is controlled by friction devices, and unless the chair is pushed by an attendant, it comes to a stop.

We are grateful to the alumnae for their gift of the EVAC+Chairs and for all our patrons who help us keep the Provincial House a safe environment for all those whom we serve. ✦
